VISION COMING INTO REALITY

For many years, the Funhouse has researched how a revised facility could better meet the needs of our community. Using a portion of the generous Robert & Phyllis Hengison gift, we are excited to announce the building renovations will begin in Spring 2017.

Modifications include:

- Open space for clearer line of sight supervision;
- New soundproof classroom spaces
- Outdoor sport court for enhanced active play & expanded teen programming;
- Greater natural light.

When complete, the renovation will enable us to better serve Funhouse families and children now and in the future.

2016 GREATEST HITS

January

Funhouse Mentor Program receives \$20,000 in grant funding from WA State Department of Social & Health Services to enhance and grow the program.

February

Stepping Up, a new Funhouse outdoor education program, is started to engage young teens in leadership and teamwork initiatives.

March

45 passionate student scientists participate in the Funhouse Science Fair. 200 community members attend the event!

April

The third annual 6th Grade Girls Leadership Group begins. Girls learn new problem solving skills while connecting with peers prior to the challenging transition to middle school.

May

Inspire Orcas is held as a new job fair event in conjunction with the Orcas Island High School and the Chamber of Commerce.

June

24% of all Orcas Island youth (148 individuals) participate in Funhouse Mentor program.

July & August

10 weeks of Funhouse Summer Camp starts, extending positive youth development opportunities and preventing summer learning loss for island youth during summer vacation.

September

149 kids enroll in our Afterschool Program. Average daily attendance is 42.

October

126 high school students, 83 elementary/middle school students, and approximately 40 parents participate in the Funhouse College Counseling event.

November

198 volunteers share their time and talents in support of Funhouse kids this year! This equals thousands of dollars in time/expertise donated to the Funhouse.

December

The Funhouse served the urgent needs of 403 youth on Orcas Island (62% of the total youth population!) these past 12 months. 53% of our families received financial assistance totaling \$46,000.


2016 FINANCIALS

Our Sustainable Funding Taskforce and Finance Committee set lofty goals during 2016 to create a strategic funding plan to ensure the Funhouse and its youth programs continue to thrive for many years to come. Our plan includes deepening donor relationships and inspiring multi-year pledges to secure a reliable source of annual funding into the future. We do this by inviting community members to bi-monthly Discovery Tours, which includes a one hour tour of our mission through storytelling and a walk about of the Funhouse facility. Almost 200 people attended tours during 2016, resulting in a huge outpouring of volunteer and financial support.

While program participation is growing, client fees are not keeping pace. This is because *more than half* of our participating families request partial or full scholarship support. We anticipate scholarships as an organizational expense to continually increase as we head into the future and serve more families.
